#### **SETTING THE SCENE**

The No. 17 Lehigh men's lacrosse team will look to bounce back from a defeat at No. 2 Loyola when the Mountain Hawks return home for a midweek matchup vs. Robert Morris on Wednesday. Opening faceoff is set for 5 p.m. on the Patriot League Network. Wednesday starts three home games for Lehigh in 11 days, also welcoming St. Bonaventure (Apr. 13) and Bucknell (Apr. 20) to close out the home regular-season slate.

Last time out, Lehigh fell into an early hole at No. 2 Loyola, which proved costly in its first defeat since February - snapping a six-game winning streak. The Mountain Hawks fought back to score nine of the game's final 15 goals, but couldn't get any closer than six (10-4, 12-6 then 15-9, which proved to be the final). Lehigh ended up outscoring Loyola 9-6 over the game's final 40:09. The Greyhounds' early blitz included nine goals in the game's first 19:51, with Pat Spencer having a hand on six of them. Spencer finished the game with 11 points (five goals, six assists), his second straight game with 10+ points for arguably the top player in the nation.

Lehigh did a good job on the supporting cast as no other Greyhound had more than three points. That included holding Kevin Lindley to one goal; he had multiple goals in eight of his first nine games of the season and has 41 goals and 44 points on the year. Chase Scanlon had just three points (all goals), tied for his second lowest point total of the season.

Sophomore Teddy Leggett helped lead Lehigh's defense, tallying seven groundballs and four caused turnovers to tie career highs in both categories. Senior Craig Chick had two groundballs and a caused turnover while freshman Tommy Schelling recorded his first-career caused turnover. On the offensive end, Schelling dished a career-high three assists, assisting on Lehigh's first two goals, and final goal of the game.

Junior Ryan Klose scored a career-high two goals, including a man-up tally. Lehigh has recorded an extra-man goal in four straight games, this coming on the heels of three consecutive games without a man-up score. Freshman Cole Kirst tied a career-high two goals at Loyola as well while senior Tristan Rai posted two goals and an assist, and classmate Mickey Fitzpatrick dished two assists. Senior Alexander Tumminello scored a goal, good for his ninth straight game with a goal. Junior Conor Gaffney struggled facing off Saturday, especially by his standards, finishing 10-of-21 with three groundballs. It marked just the second time this season Gaffney finished under 60 percent in a given game. He did eclipse the 500-career win plateau, becoming the first in school history and fourth in league history to reach that milestone. Sophomore James Spence made 12 saves in goal, six coming in the third quarter and three in the fourth.

With the loss, Loyola captured sole possession of first place at 5-0 while Lehigh fell to 5-1. The Mountain Hawks have two Patriot League games remaining (vs. Bucknell and at Holy Cross). They are

still alive for first place while finding themselves in a strong position to earn the No. 2 seed and a bye into the semifinals of the Patriot League Tournament. Lehigh is now 3-3 this season vs. ranked opponents. The Mountain Hawks' three losses are against teams currently in the top 10 of this week's national media and coaches polls: Loyola, Virginia and Cornell.

Lehigh will look to get back on track on Wednesday when it hosts Robert Morris in the first-ever meeting between the two sides. Despite owning a 3-7 record, the Colonials were top 20 in the *Inside Lacrosse* Face-Off Yearbook, coming off an NEC Championship and NCAA Tournament appearance las season.

# LEHIGH LACROSSE AT A GLANCE...

- Lehigh's 39 victories from 2012-14 was tied for third in the nation during that span. The win total only trailed Duke and Loyola and was tied with Denver.
- Lehigh has reached double-figure victories in four of the last seven seasons (2012, 2013, 2014, 2018) after having double-figure wins just four times in the first 112 years of program history: 1969, 1993, 1994 and 1997.

## LAST TIME OUT

BALTIMORE (4/6/19) - No. 2 Loyola jumped out to a 6-0 lead after one quarter and 9-0 advantage early in the second, and despite the Mountain Hawks beginning to hit their stride, the closest they could the margin to was six in a 15-9 defeat on Saturday. Lehigh pulled within 104 and 12-6 in the third quarter, needing one more surge to pull within striking distance, but the Greyhounds always had an answer. The loss is Lehigh's first since February, snapping a six-game winning streak. The Mountain Hawks fall to 7-4 on the season, 5-1 in Patriot League play while Loyola improves to 8-2 and 5-0.

# LAST TIME VS. ROBERT MORRIS

First Meeting

#### IF LEHIGH BEATS ROBERT MORRIS

- Lehigh would improve to 8-4 overall, its second straight season (and fifth time in the last eight years) at 8-4 or better after 12 games.
- · The Mountain Hawks would win their fourth straight home game and improve to 5-1 at home on the season.
- · Lehigh would pick up its first-ever win over Robert Morris, coming in its first game vs. the Colonials.
- · The Mountain Hawks would win for the seventh time in their last eight games.

#### **SCOUTING ROBERT MORRIS**

A preseason top 20 team, the Colonials are 3-7 on the season, but a number of those losses have been slim defeats to quality teams. Included was a 14-11 loss at No. 17/16 Georgetown and double overtime defeat at No. 13/11 High Point. Robert Morris has won two straight, beating Saint Joseph's 15-9 and Wagner 17-6. The Colonials features the nation's 10th most prolific scoring offense (13.30 goals per game), but they've allowed 14.00 goals per contest which is 70th in the nation (out of 73 teams). Five Colonials have 22 points or more, led by Tyson Gibson with 18 goals and a team-leading 22 assists for 40 points. Ryan Smith has 38 points (24 goals, 14 assists) while Corson Kealey has 37 (team-leading 31 goals, six assists). Jack Toomb leads the defense with 17 caused turnovers while faceoff specialist Trey Arnold leads the way with 55 groundballs and a 52.1 percentage (101-of-194). Alex Heger has started all 10 games in goal, tallying a 14.17 goals against average and 47.1 save percentage.

#### HARD-FOUGHT W VS. BOSTON U.

- The Mountain Hawks used a 5-0 third quarter against Boston University, on their way to a 10-8 win, Lehigh's sixth straight victory.
- Junior **Andrew Eichelberger** began the game (and third quarter) with goals; he finished with a teamhigh three goals for his second-career hat trick.
- -Senior **Tristan Rai** tied a career-high four assists while seniors **Lucas Spence** and **Alexander Tumminello** had two goals apiece. Both of Tumminello's goals were on the extra man to up his season total to six.
- The Boston University win, along with out-of-town results, *clinched the Mountain Hawks' ninth straight Patriot League Tournament, a run that began in 2011*. Lehigh was the only team in the league to qualify for each of the last eight tournaments heading into the season.
- -Senior **Craig Chick** had a groundball and two caused turnovers against the Terriers to lead the defense. He helped contain Boston University's Chris Gray, who leads the country with 70 points on the year. Gray's five points on Saturday were actually tied for his second-lowest total on the season, and only two of those points (a goal and assist) came with Chick covering him six on six. Gray's other points came on the extra man or when the Mountain Hawks were playing zone.
- Chick reached 200 career groundballs in the victory while sophomore **Teddy Leggett** had six groundballs to reach the 100-groundball plateau.
- Sophomore **James Spence** made 13 saves to continue his strong play. Included was stopping 6-of-6 in the third quarter to help the Mountain Hawks turn a 5-5 tie into a 10-5 lead heading to the fourth. In Lehigh's six-game winning streak, Spence stopped 75-of-122 shots sent his way (61.5 percent).
- Lehigh's six-game winning streak marked its longest since winning seven straight in 2013.

### JAMES SPENCE EARNS THIRD GOALKEEPER OF WEEK HONOR (MAR. 25)

For the time this season (all in the month of March), sophomore **James Spence** has been named Patriot League Goalkeeper of the Week, as announced by the league on Monday, Mar. 25. Spence tied a career-high 17 saves in Saturday's 15-8 win at Navy. With their fifth straight victory, the Mountain Hawks moved up three spots to No. 14 in the USILA Coaches Poll, remained at No. 15 in the Inside Lacrosse Media Poll and jumped to No. 13 in the Nike/USL Top 20. For the second time in three games, Spence posted a career-high 17 saves – a mark originally set 11 days prior at Rutgers. Spence had 10 first-half saves at Navy, allowing just five goals, to help the Mountain Hawks stay within 5-4 at the half. He went on to stop 5-of-6 in the fourth quarter to help Lehigh pull away. In the end, Spence held Navy to eight goals, its second-lowest goal total of the season in eight games. The 17 saves were the most saves by any individual (or team) against the Midshipmen this season.

#### PULLING AWAY FROM NAVY (MAR. 23)

- The Mountain Hawks took a 3-1 lead after a quarter of play, but scored just one of the next six goals to fall behind 6-4. That's when Lehigh struck with six straight goals, 10 of the next 11 and 11 of the final 13 to cruise to the 15-8 win, the program's largest-ever road win at Navy (seven goals) and second largest margin of victory against the Mids in program history (home or road).
- Lehigh is now 7-4 against Navy since 2011. Prior to that point, the program was 1-29 in its first 30 all-time meetings.
- Senior **Lucas Spence** helped lead the offense this time out, posting six points via four goals and two assists. Five of the points came after halftime.
- Senior **Tristan Rai** had two goals and two assists while classmates **Mickey Fitzpatrick** and **Alexander Tumminello** each scored twice. Freshman **Tommy Schelling** had a career-high three points (two goals, one assist), including a fastbreak, game-tying goal at 7:00 of the third quarter. Junior **Ryan Klose** had a goal and assist for his first-career multi-point game. Junior **Crew Cintron** tallied a goal and assist as well.
- The Mountain Hawks were 2-of-2 on the extra man and after a tough start to the season man-up, are now 5-of-7 over the last two games after beginning the season 5-of-24.
- Sophomore **Matt Douglas** had a breakout game defensively, collecting a career-high eight groundballs, double his previous career high of four.
- Senior Craig Chick recorded three groundballs (to reach 199 in his career) and a caused turnover.
- Junior Conor Gaffney won 17-of-26 faceoffs with nine groundballs while also scoring his first-career goal in the game's final minute.
- -Sophomore **James Spence** made 17 saves to tie a career high, set 11 days prior at Rutgers. He won Patriot League Goalkeeper of the Week for the third time this month.

## **TOPPING RIVAL LAFAYETTE (MAR. 17)**

- Against the Leopards, the Mountain Hawks jumped out to a 4-0 lead after a quarter of play. It was the third quarter this season Lehigh has held an opponent scoreless (and first time it happened in the first quarter). The closest Lafayette would get in the second half was four (9-5), but Lehigh immediately answered with a 6-0 run to erase any doubt and win, 15-7.
- The starting attack of seniors **Tristan Rai**, **Lucas Spence** and **Mickey Fitzpatrick** combined for 16 points (eight goals, eight assists). Rai tied a career high with seven points (four goals, three assists), tying last season's game at Lafayette. Spence had three goals and three assists. Fitzpatrick had a goal and two assists for a career-high tying three points. Fitzpatrick had a hand in Lehigh's first three goals to get the Mountain Hawks going.
- Senior Alexander Tumminello posted his third-career hat trick (all this season), with all three goals

coming on the extra man. It marked the first time Lehigh had three hat tricks in a game since exactly one year prior at Lafayette when Spence, Rai and Fitzpatrick all did.

- Junior **Andrew Eichelberger** and freshman **Cole Kirst** each had a goal and assist on Sunday. Freshman **Tommy Schelling** made his first-career start and one day later, was named Patriot League Rookie of the Week due in large part to his game-winning goal at No. 15 Rutgers on Tuesday.
- Defensively, senior **Craig Chick** led the charge against Lafayette with a groundball and three caused turnovers to up his career total to 137. He was also honored by the league, winning Patriot League Defensive Player of the Week for the second straight week.
- Alongside Chick on close defense, freshman **Michael Hagenberger** caused two turnovers in his first-career start while senior **Matt Rimol** collected a career-high four groundballs, double his previous career high.
- Several Mountain Hawks posted career highs in groundballs on Sunday, including Spence (7), Fitzpatrick (5) and junior **Christian McHugh** (3).
- Sophomore **Matt Douglas** tied his career high with four GBs. As a team, Lehigh had 52, its second game this season with more than 50 (along with the season opener at NJIT when the Mountain Hawks had 56).
- Junior **Conor Gaffney** won 15-of-18 with 11 groundballs, in a strong bounce-back effort following an 8-of-17 showing at Rutgers.
- In the end, Lehigh picked up its 10th straight win over Lafayette, tied for the program's longest-ever winning streak against the Leopards.

# THIRD STRAIGHT RANKED WIN, BEATING RUTGERS (MAR. 12)

- Lehigh picked up a huge win at Rutgers in a nationally-televised showdown on the Big Ten Network. The Mountain Hawks enjoyed a strong start, leading 1-0, 2-1, 3-2 and 5-4, but the Scarlet Knights responded to take an 8-5 lead late in the third quarter. Senior **Craig Chick** caused a turnover on one end and scored a goal just moments later on the other, helping spark the first of two 4-0 runs down the stretch. The first came in the final 3:10 of the third quarter to take a 9-8 lead. Then, after Rutgers scored at 10:20 and 9:37 of the fourth, the Mountain Hawks scored four times in the final 5:50 to turn a 10-9 deficit into a 13-10 win.
- Freshman **Tommy Schelling** scored the game-winning goal with 2:19 remaining, giving Lehigh an 11-10 lead. Senior **Alexander Tumminello** added his career-high fourth of the game at the 1:21 mark, and junior **Christian McHugh** scored his first-career goal with 30 seconds remaining.
- Tumminello led the offense with four goals and now leads the Mountain Hawks with 13 goals on the season, already eight more goals than he had in his career entering the season.
- -Senior **Lucas Spence** had two goals and two assists, with two goals and one assist coming in the game's final 15:05. In the end, he had a hand in three of Lehigh's final five goals. Senior **Mickey Fitzpatrick** helped spark Lehigh's start with two of its first four goals. Schelling finished with two points, also dishing an assist on McHugh's final goal.
- -Sophomore **James Spence** was tremendous in goal, making a career-high 17 saves, nine in the first half and eight in the second. He stopped five-of-seven shots in the fourth to help in the Mountain Hawks' comeback. It marked his second game this season with 16 or more saves, as he owns an 8.80 goals against average and 55.2 save percentage on the year. In the process, he eclipsed 200 career saves.
- Junior faceoff specialist **Conor Gaffney** struggled a bit, especially early, but sophomore **Joel Trucksess** entered and won 8-of-10 faceoffs with four groundballs. He also scored a big goal just 12 seconds after Chick, to quickly pull the Mountain Hawks back within 8-7. Despite Gaffney's struggles, he still finished a respectable 8-of-17, and eclipsed 250 career faceoff wins in the process
- Defensively, Chick had three groundballs and three caused turnovers, all three caused turnovers coming in the game's final 19 minutes.
- Sophomore Teddy Leggett added six groundballs and a caused turnover.
- Lehigh actually lost many statistical battles, including shots (45-34), groundballs (39-36), but Spence's saves and Trucksess' second-half faceoff wins proved critical.

#### CHICK NAMED TO TEWAARATON WATCH LIST

Lehigh men's lacrosse senior **Craig Chick**, currently third in NCAA history for caused turnovers, has garnered another honor as he was named to the Tewaaraton Award Watch List, as announced Thursday night, Feb. 28. One of just 50 honorees nationally and five in the Patriot League recognized, Chick marks Lehigh's Tewaaraton Award candidate in as many years – following classmate Andrew Pettit who was added to the watch list in late March. Chick

is Lehigh's first honoree named to the initial watch list since Dan Taylor in 2015. The Tewaaraton Watch Lists include the top players across all three divisions of NCAA lacrosse and highlight the early contenders for the 2019 Tewaaraton Award, which honors the top male and female college lacrosse player in the United States. The selection committees are made up of premier collegiate coaches and are appointed annually by The Tewaaraton Foundation.

Chick was an *Inside Lacrosse* preseason All-American after garnering honorable mention then second team laurels following his sophomore and junior seasons, respectively. Chick also garnered USILA honorable mention All-America recognition following his junior campaign. The two-time first team All-Patriot League honoree entered his senior season with 167 groundballs, 118 caused turnovers, six goals and 10 assists. He recorded a nation's leading 37 caused turnovers as a freshman and school-record 40 as a sophomore, before breaking his own mark with 41 as a junior.

#### LEHIGH RANKED 13TH IN PRESEASON POLLS

With the season set to open this Saturday against NJIT, the Lehigh men's lacrosse team has been ranked No. 13 in both preseason polls released Monday – the USILA Coaches Poll and *Inside Lacrosse* Division I Media Poll. This comes after the Mountain Hawks were also ranked 13th in the *Inside Lacrosse* Face-Off Yearbook and *Lacrosse Magazine* Nike/US Lacrosse Rankings.

The national rankings are Lehigh's highest since being ranked 11th by the coaches and 10th by the media entering the 2013 season.

#### **TEAM CAPTAINS ANNOUNCED**

With the 2019 season opener now less than three months away, Lehigh head men's lacrosse coach **Kevin Cassese** announced the Mountain Hawks' 2019 captains on Monday. Seniors **Craig Chick**, **Andrew Pettit** and **Chris Kiernan** will all serve as captains, with **Eddie Bouhall** and **Lucas Spence** holding the role of assistant captains.

#### CHICK, PETTIT NAMED SENIOR CLASS AWARD CANDIDATES

Strong on and off the lacrosse field, Lehigh men's lacrosse seniors Craig Chick and Andrew Pettit have been named two of the 30 candidates nation-wide for the prestigious Senior CLASS Award, as announced on Monday, Mar. 4. An acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School ®, the Senior CLASS Award focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities. Lehigh is one of just five schools nationally with multiple honorees (also Ohio State, Army West Point, Marquette and Loyola), while the Mountain Hawks have had at least one honoree in six of the last seven years. This marks the first time in program history that Lehigh has featured multiple honorees. To be eligible for the Senior CLASS Award, a student-athlete must be classified as an NCAA Division I senior and have notable achievements in four areas of excellence: community, classroom, character and competition. UPDATE: Chick went on to be named a finalist in late March, Lehigh's third finalist in the last nine years.

#### CHICK, BOUHALL SELECTED IN MAJOR LEAGUE LAX DRAFT

Just hours after picking up a hard-fought 11-8 win over No. 16 Army West Point, a pair of Lehigh men's lacrosse senior defensemen were selected in the Major League Lacrosse Draft, held Saturday evening (Mar. 9) in Charlotte, North Carolina. **Craig Chick** was picked in the second round (17th overall) by the Dallas Rattlers while **Eddie Bouhall** went in the sixth round (49th overall) to the Atlanta Blaze. Both are multiple-time All-Patriot League honorees while Chick is a two-time All-American, and they currently stand No. 1 and 3 in school history for career caused turnovers

#### PRESEASON HONORS FOR LEHIGH

Lehigh has been predicted to finish second in the Patriot League, in a vote of the league's head coaches and Sports Information Directors, as announced before the season. In addition, the Mountain Hawks feature a league-high five preseason All-League honorees: seniors Craig Chick, Andrew Pettit and Eddie Bouhall, junior Conor Gaffney and sophomore Teddy Leggett.

The Mountain Hawks finished with 109 points and two first-place votes, only trailing Loyola, who garnered the other 18 first-place votes to finish with 128 points. Lehigh is coming off a run to the Patriot League Championship Game last season, its fourth title-game appearance in seven years and first since 2004. After Lehigh in the preseason poll was Navy in third (96 points), Boston University (89), Army West Point (62), Bucknell (57), Colgate (56), Holy Cross (24) and Lafayette (20).

## CASSESE INDUCTED IN US LACROSSE HALL OF FAME

Following an All-America playing career at Duke and success in both international and professional lacrosse, Lehigh head coach Kevin Cassese was inducted into the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame this September as part of the Class of 2018. As a player, Cassese was a three-time All-American at Duke before playing on the U.S. Men's National Teams in 2002, 2006 and 2010, winning two gold medals and serving as captain of the 2010 squad. Cassese was inducted as part of the class of nine, which also included Elizabeth Leigh Bradley Friedman, A.J. Haugen, Alex Kahoe, Phyllis Kilgour, David Morrow, Ryan Powell, Denise Wescott, and Tami Worley. The ceremony took place on Saturday, Sept. 29 at The Grand Lodge in Hunt Valley, Md.

#### **PROLIFIC PETTIT**

Senior Andrew Pettit has emerged into one of the Patriot League's, and nation's, top goal scorers. He led the Mountain Hawks in goals (46) and points (66), good for fourth and ninth in school history. He finished 10th nationally in goals per game (2.71) and 20th in points per contest (3.88). Pettit was also third in the country in man-up goals (10).

Last season, Pettit led the Mountain Hawks in goals (or tied for the lead) nine

times in 17 games, and had nine hat tricks in 2018. One highlight was a career-high tying five-goal effort at Army West Point, which included a natural hat trick (three straight goals) in the fourth quarter to turn a one-goal deficit into a two-goal lead. He also had seven points (three goals, four assists) in a 13-8 win at No. 18/19 Hofstra (Mar. 20), contributing to more goals himself (7) than Hofstra (the nation's No. 1 scoring defense) were allowing entering the day (6.33). Pettit tied a career high and Patriot League Tournament single-game record with five goals in the Patriot League Quarterfinal victory over Colgate. He shattered the Patriot League record for goals in an entire league tournament (12); the previous record was eight. Pettit was added to the Tewaaraton Award Watch List on Mar. 22.

Pettit has recorded multiple goals in 27 of his last 32 games dating back to the end of his freshman season. He owns 28-career multi-goal games, 31-career multi-point games and 16-career hat tricks. Pettit has scored a goal in 17 straight games, tied for the fourth longest active streak in the nation entering the season.

#### TREMENDOUS TRIO

Senior Craig Chick, sophomore Teddy Leggett and senior Eddie Bouhall have had a knack of taking the ball away. Last season, the three by far and away lead the nation in caused turnovers among three teammates. The 85 combined caused turnovers last season were tied for the most by any Lehigh trio in school history.

#### RISE OF THE DEFENSE

Stellar defense played a key role in Lehigh's success from 2012-14 when it won two consecutive Patriot League Championships in 2012 and 2013 then made it back to the title game in 2014. Last season, the Mountain Hawks once again featured one of the nation's top defenses.

#### STELLAR SENIORS

Lehigh's current senior class has been stellar. As sophomores, they combined for 80 goals (58.4% of team total), 42 assists (46.7%), 145 groundballs (32.6%) and 76 caused turnovers (65.5%) last season (2017). As a team, Lehigh finished with 137 goals, 90 assists, 445 groundballs and 116 caused turnovers. Seven started much of their sophomore years (Eddie Bouhall, Craig Chick and Matt Rimol on defense, Lucas Spence in the midfield and Andrew Pettit and Tristan Rai at attack, and Chris Kiernan in goal). Mickey Fitzpatrick also started three games in the midfield.

As juniors, the class combined for 127 goals (out of 180, 70.6% of team total) and 77 assists (out of 112, 68.8%). Defensively, the class tallied 207 groundballs (out of 524, 39.5%) and 82 caused turnovers (out of 131, 62.6%).

So far this season, as seniors, they have combined for 67 goals (out of 118, 56.8 percent), 49 assists (out of 65, 75.4 percent) and 51 caused turnovers (out of 100, 51.0 percent).

#### EXTRA-MAN PROFICIENCY

Lehigh has consistently featured one of the nation's top extra-man units. In 2018, the Mountain Hawks led the nation with a 63.4 percentage (26-of-41), food for second in NCAA history. Detroit holds the all-time record, converting at a 70.8 percent clip in 2014. So far this year, Lehigh is 34.1 percent on the man-up (14-41).

- Senior **Tristan Rai** enjoyed a sensational start to his collegiate career, finishing 2016 second on the Mountain Hawks in goals (31) and points (41). He led the nation in shooting percentage (.534), turning 58 shots into 31 goals.

#### CHAOTIC CHICK

Senior **Craig Chick** has emerged as a premier defensive player in the country as *he is first in caused turnovers since the beginning of 2016 (140) (as of Monday, Apr. 8)*. He is already third in NCAA history in career caused turnovers.

Chick finished his freshman season as the national leader in caused turnovers with 37. His big breakout came on Apr. 12 at Princeton when he posted 10 groundballs and eight caused turnovers. The eight caused turnovers were the most by a Lehigh player since Evan Guerrero had nine against Saint Joseph's on Feb. 14, 2009. Chick tied for the most caused turnovers in the nation in 2016 (Division I) and tied Princeton's Sherrerd Field record, originally set by Villanova's Brian Karalunas. Chick followed with seven groundballs and seven caused turnovers just four days later against Cornell. Chick finished the season with 41 groundballs and 25 caused turnovers over his last eight games. As a sophomore, Chick posted 58 groundballs and school-record 40 caused turnovers (third in the nation). On five different occasions, Chick tallied four or more caused turnovers and had a stretch of 10 straight games with multiple caused turnovers. Then as a junior, Chick broke his own school record by posting 41 caused turnovers. He broke Tripp Telesco's school record at Hofstra and broke the Patriot League mark at Boston University. With two caused turnovers vs. Cornell, Chick moved into the top 10 in NCAA history.

#### 2019 Season Notes

- Chick had two groundballs and a caused turnover at No. 2 Loyola (Apr. 6).
- On Mar. 30 against Boston University, Chick tallied a groundball (the 200th of his career) and a team-high two caused turnovers while covering the Terriers' Chris Gray and holding him to a goal and assist while covering him. Gray was the first player in the nation to reach 70 points on the season.
- On Mar. 23 at Navy, Chick tallied three groundballs and a caused turnover.
- On Mar. 17 vs. Lafayette, Chick recorded a groundball and three caused turnovers. Combined with his effort at Rutgers, he was named Patriot League Defensive Player of the Week for a second straight week.
- On Mar. 12 at No. 15 Rutgers, Chick had three groundballs and three caused turnovers, all caused turnovers coming in the game's final 18:23 to help spark the Mountain Hawks' 13-10 comeback victory.
- On Mar. 9 vs. No. 17 Army West Point, Chick recorded four groundballs and four caused turnovers to earn Patriot League Defensive Player of the Week for the second time this season.
- On Feb. 15 at No. 11 Virginia, Chick posted four groundballs and two caused turnovers.
- On Feb. 9 against Hofstra, Chick recorded five groundballs and two caused turnovers to move into third place in NCAA history for caused turnovers in a career (125).
- On Feb. 2 vs. NJIT, Chick had five caused turnovers (along with nine groundballs) to move from eighth into a tie for fourth in NCAA history with 123 CTs in his career. Following the effort, he was named Patriot League Defensive Player of the Week for the third time in his career.

#### **DEFENSE IS KEY**

- Lehigh owned the nation's second-ranked defense in 2012 (6.61 goals per game) and followed by finishing sixth in 2013 (7.94) and second in 2014 (7.22). In 2015, the Mountain Hawks allowed 10.06 goals per game while they allowed 10.87 per contest in 2016. In 2017, Lehigh allowed 10.00 goals per game. Then in 2018, the Mountain Hawks allowed 9.47 goals per game, 22nd in the nation.
- The Mountain Hawks allowed single-digit goals in 10 games, including five games allowing seven goals or fewer.
- So far this year, Lehigh has allowed 9.18 goals per game, seventh in the nation.
   In the season opener on Feb. 2 vs. NJIT, the Mountain Hawks held the Highlanders to just 21 shots, including four in just the first and second quarters. Lehigh allowed just three goals over the game's first 32:46.
- A week later, Lehigh held Hofstra (Feb. 9) to just four goals, including none for the first 24:07 and only one over the game's first 46:22.
- The Mountain Hawks held down a potent Virginia offense on Feb. 15, which finished seventh nationally in scoring in 2018. Lehigh allowed just two goals in the game's first 23:20 and only four in the first half.
- Lehigh's defense stood tall early at No. 4 Cornell (Feb. 24), not allowing a goal for the game's first 12:09 and allowing just seven over the first 45:46 against a potent Big Red attack.
- The Mountain Hawks allowed just two first-half goals at No. 16 Colgate in the Patriot League opener (Mar. 2) and just eight for the game against a Raiders' team averaging 11.33 entering the contest.
- Lehigh held No. 17 Army West Point (Mar. 9) to one goal over the game's first 20:17 and only five through three quarters of play. The eight goals allowed for the game was tied for Army's fewest scored this season up until that point.
- On Mar. 12 at No. 15 Rutgers, the Mountain Hawks held Rutgers to 10 goals, including two over the game's first 17:21 and just two over the final 19:43 in a 13-10 win.
- Against Lafayette on Mar. 17, Lehigh held Lafayette scoreless in the first quarter -- the third quarter this season the Mountain Hawks shut-out an opponent in a quarter. Lehigh allowed just two goals over the game's first 29:33 and five over the first 55:18.
- At Navy on Mar. 23, the Mountain Hawks held the Mids to eight goals, their second smallest goal total of the season. After allowing six goals over the first 32:42, Lehigh allowed just two over the final 27:18.
- Facing Boston University on Mar. 30, Lehigh held the Terriers to just eight goals, tied for their second-lowest total of the season. Boston U. was averaged 12.3 goals per game over its first 10 contests.
- After a tough start at No. 2 Loyola (Apr. 6), the Mountain Hawks allowed just six goals over the game's final 40:09.

# **SHUTOUT STREAKS**

- In 2012, the Lehigh defense was dominant in stretches, pitching a shutout streak of 15 or more minutes in 15-of-17 games, including 13-of-14 wins. Then in 2013, the defense posted 17 separate shutout streaks of 15+ minutes including in 10 of its 12 wins. In 2014, the Mountain Hawks had 15 streaks of 15+ minutes and 25 streaks of 10+ minutes. In 2015, Lehigh had 11 streaks of 15+ minutes and 25 of 10+ minutes.
- $\bullet$  In 2016, the Mountain Hawks owned four streaks of 20+ minutes, eight streaks of 15+ minutes and 20 of 10+ minutes.
- In 2017, Lehigh owned 11 streaks of 15+ minutes and 20 of 10+ minutes.
- In 2018, the Mountain Hawks had 14 streaks of 15+ minutes and 35 of

10+ minutes.

# **KEVIN CASSESE**Smith Family Head Coach 12th Season as Lehigh Head Coach

A U.S. Lacrosse National Hall of Fame inductee, Kevin Cassese enters his 12th season as Lehigh's head men's lacrosse coach in 2019. In Cassese's time, he has led the Mountain Hawks to back-to-back Patriot League Championships in 2012 and 2013 followed by a third straight appearance in the league title game in 2014 and a return trip to the championship game in 2018. Lehigh is the only men's lacrosse program in the league to reach eight of the last eight Patriot League Tournaments as excitement continues to build. Heading into the 2019 season, the Mountain Hawks have been ranked in every "way-early" rankings, coming in as high as No. 8 by the Baltimore Sun.

In the past year, Cassese led the Mountain Hawks to three wins over nationally-ranked opponents and a return to the national rankings (as high as No. 12) as Lehigh advanced to the Patriot League Championship Game for the first time since 2014. Less than a month after the season, Cassese was named an inductee in the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame Class of 2018 following a stellar playing career at Duke, in Major League Lacrosse and for Team USA.

The 2018 season saw Lehigh jump back into the national spotlight, beginning with road wins at No. 12 Army West Point and No. 18/19 Hofstra in the span of 10 days. The Mountain Hawks went on to finish the season 10-7, including 5-3 in Patriot League play. Earning the No. 4 seed in the league tournament, Lehigh dominated Colgate at home (11-6) then picked up a 10-9 overtime win against No. 11/13 Navy, just days after the Midshipmen won at Syracuse. Lucas Spence scored the game-winner less than one minute into overtime as Spence (58 points: 35 goals, 23 assists) and Andrew Pettit (66 points: 46 goals, 20 assists) combined for 124 points in 2018. Pettit, defenseman Craig Chick and faceoff specialist Conor Gaffney were named first team All-Patriot League while Spence, defenseman Eddie Bouhall and long-stick midfielder Teddy Leggett earned second-team laurels. Leggett also won the Lehigh Athletics' J. Daniel Nolan Award presented to the department's top first-year male student-athlete. Gaffney was named the Patriot League Scholar-Athlete of the Year while being named a third team Academic All-American by CoSIDA.

Chick continued to re-write the record books, breaking his previous school record for caused turnovers with 41. He ended the year with 118 in his career, which is already a school and Patriot League record, and top 10 in NCAA history (with Chick's senior year left to play). After the season, Chick was named a second team Inside Lacrosse All-American while garnering honorable mention All-America from the USILA. As a team, the Mountain Hawks led the nation in extra-man offense for the second time in seven years as Lehigh's 63.4 percentage was good for second in NCAA history. At one point, Lehigh converted eight straight man-up opportunities and 16-of-19.

In 2017, Lehigh's season was highlighted by two consecutive home wins over nationally-ranked foes, defeating No. 16/18 Boston University (10-6) and No. 13/14 Princeton (15-10) while earning a 9-6 home victory over rival Bucknell on Senior Night to earn the program's seventh straight Patriot League Tournament berth. Three Mountain Hawks earned All-League, including Chick, who was named to the first team and garnered honorable mention All-America by Inside Lacrosse. Chick broke a school record with 40 caused turnovers, one year after leading the nation in that category.

The program's breakthrough came in 2012 when Lehigh finished 14-3 and won its first-ever Patriot League Tournament Championship to advance to the program's first NCAA Tournament. The Mountain

Hawks followed that with a 12-5 campaign in 2013, winning both the regular season and tournament titles. Despite losing a large and talented senior class, Lehigh still went 13-5 in 2014 and advanced to the Patriot League Championship Game once again.

In 2012, Cassese led the Mountain Hawks to a school-record 14 wins, a program record nine-game winning streak and their highest-ever national ranking; Lehigh came in at No. 4 nationally in the final Coaches Poll following the regular season.

Following a home-opening loss to Villanova in 2012, Lehigh promptly won nine straight games and 13-of-14 to advance to the NCAA Tournament as the No. 7 overall seed. The Mountain Hawks hosted eventual National Finalist Maryland and gave the Terps their toughest fight on their road to the title game. Despite falling down 6-1 in the first half, Lehigh responded with seven straight goals in front of a standing room only crowd of 2,278 at the Ulrich Sports Complex (and in front of a national audience on ESPNU).

Lehigh posted an impressive 8-3 record against nationally-ranked foes, including a big 9-8 win at No. 4 North Carolina in March, propelling the Mountain Hawks into the national polls for the first time since 2000. Lehigh ended a number of long droughts, defeating UNC for the first time since 1951, Yale for the first time since 1918 and Penn State for the first time since 1971. A big part of the success came from the Mountain Hawks' defense, which stood as the No. 2 scoring defense (only behind Notre Dame), holding opponents to only 6.81 goals per game. Lehigh picked up its first shutout in 40 years with a 13-0 triumph over Manhattan, allowed only two goals to VMI and five or fewer to Penn State, Navy, Holy Cross, Penn and Saint Joseph's. Cassese was named Patriot League Coach of the Year while freshman Matt Poillon became Lehigh's first-ever Goalkeeper of the Year. Eight cracked the All-Patriot League Team, tied for most in school history.

In 2013, Lehigh won seven straight games to finish undefeated in Patriot League play and earn the right to host the league tournament. Lehigh went on to dominate Bucknell on its home turf (11-5) for its second straight league championship. The awards continued to roll in for the Mountain Hawks as Poillon was named Patriot League Goalie of the Year for a second straight season and a school-record four players were named USILA All-Americans, breaking the record of three set a season prior. In addition, the Mountain Hawks placed a league-best three players on the Academic All-Patriot League Team.

The success continued into 2014 as the Mountain Hawks won 13 games, just one shy of tying the school record set just two years prior. Lehigh earned a thrilling 7-6 triple overtime victory over No. 20 Villanova in February and earned convincing league wins over Bucknell (9-3), Navy (13-2), Holy Cross (20-4) and Lafayette (17-6). The Mountain Hawks defeated Navy in the Patriot League Quarterfinals at home before earning a 12-11 semifinal victory over Army behind a Reid Weber goal with just three seconds remaining.

Several Mountain Hawks enjoyed breakout seasons, led by attackman Dan Taylor who recorded 45 points over his last seven games to finish with 76 points, which far and away led the Patriot League and was most among Canadian players in all of Division I Lacrosse. Taylor was named a first team All-Patriot League honoree, as was defenseman Tripp Telesco who finished with 44 groundballs and 36 caused turnovers. Three others were named All-League while Poillon, Taylor and Telesco were named honorable mention All-Americans as well.

After struggling to begin 2015, the Mountain Hawks ended the season on a high note, winning five of their last six regular season games, defeating a pair of nationally-ranked opponents in a five-day span (No. 14 Princeton and No. 18 Stony Brook). Taylor enjoyed another sensational season, posting 77 points to earn Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year honors and honorable mention All-America recognition. Meanwhile, a young team in 2016 went on to advance to the program's sixth straight Patriot League Tournament, finishing 4-4 in league play highlighted by a thrilling 8-7 win at No. 20 Boston University.

Setting the stage for the program's breakthrough of 2012, the Mountain Hawks jumped squarely into the national lacrosse picture in 2011 by not only qualifying for the Patriot League postseason, but also proving they could compete with anyone in the country. Lehigh advanced to its first Patriot League Tournament since 2006. The Mountain Hawks got

off to a quick 3-1 start, which included a 14-10 triumph over Navy, the program's first victory over the Midshipmen in nearly 100 years. Lehigh posted the nation's eighth biggest improvement in 2011, according to LaxPower.com's computer rankings, which takes into account many of the factors used by the NCAA Tournament selection committee.

In his first four years at Lehigh, Cassese mentored a total of nine All-Patriot League honorees, including four in 2011. Faceoff specialist Ryan Snyder cracked the first team after winning 61.6 percent of his draws and scooping a then-Patriot League record 118 groundballs. Jonathan Stumpf was not only named to the second team, but also became Lehigh's first-ever CoSIDA Academic All-American while being named a Senior CLASS Award first team All-American, USILA Scholar All-American and Patriot League Scholar-Athlete of the Year. Stumpf (along with teammate and current Lehigh assistant coach Will Scudder) also played in the USILA North-South All-Star Game where he netted the eventual game-winning goal for the South.

Under Cassese's watch, Lehigh has sent several players to professional lacrosse. Seven have been selected in the Major League Lacrosse Collegiate Draft since 2013 while multiple others have been picked in the player pool. Roman Lao-Gosney (Florida) has played in more than 50 career games since joining the league in 2012 while twin brother Cameron (Florida), Mike Noone (Ohio) and Noah Molnar (Denver) are all veterans of the league with Molnar winning an MLL Championship in 2016 and Noone in 2017. In addition, Taylor was the first selection of defending National Lacrosse League Champion Saskatchewan Rush in the 2015 NLL Collegiate Draft. He was picked 12th overall and went on to win a championship with the Rush in 2016.

Cassese's players have been involved in US Lacrosse as well as defenseman Ty Souders tried out for the U.S. Under-19 Team as part of a three-day training camp at UMBC. Cameron and Roman Lao-Gosney also participated in numerous scrimmages for Team USA, beginning with the Capital Lacrosse Classic on Oct. 7, 2012.

On a personal level, Cassese made his coaching debut for US Lacrosse at the 2014 World Lacrosse Championships in Denver, serving as an assistant coach under Team USA head coach Richie Meade (Furman), alongside assistants Dave Pietramala (Johns Hopkins) and Jeff Tambroni (Penn State). Cassese's responsibilities included faceoff coordinator and goalie coordinator while handling rides, clears and the sub game.

As a player, Cassese had an impressive career representing the USA. He was named to the 2010 United States Men's National Lacrosse Team, traveling to Manchester, England. He was named co-captain of that gold medal winning team, alongside Ryan Powell (Syracuse). That marked the third time Cassese earned a spot on the National Team. Cassese also helped the United States to the gold medal at the 2002 International Lacrosse Federation World Championships, while still an undergraduate at Duke University. He was also a member of the United States team that placed second at the 2006 ILF World Championships in London, Ontario.

Cassese is one of the most decorated student-athletes in Duke history. He was a two-time captain and three-time All-ACC selection. Cassese helped lead the Blue Devils to three NCAA Tournament appearances and a pair of ACC Championships during his collegiate career. Cassese earned All-America honors on three separate occasions, including first-team accolades in 2002 and 2003. Cassese, who scored 80 goals and handed out 38 assists in his career, was a two-time Tewaaraton Trophy finalist and garnered ACC Player of the Year honors in 2001. In 2002, Cassese was the recipient of the Lt. Donald MacLaughlin, Jr. Award as the nation's top midfielder. He was also a standout in the classroom, graduating with a 3.59 GPA while earning his Bachelor's Degree in Sociology from Duke. He was selected as a USILA Scholar All-American, ACC Academic Honor Roll member, and was named the ACC's Weaver-James-Corrigan Honorary Award recipient for outstanding athletic and academic achievement.

After his time at Duke, Cassese continued his playing career in Major League Lacrosse for seven years. He was the second overall selection in the 2003 MLL Draft by the Rochester Rattlers. Among his professional accomplishments are a pair of MLL Rookie of the Week honors and a spot in both the 2006 and 2010 MLL All-Star Games. He was named MVP of the 2006 All-Star Game. Cassese was traded to the

Philadelphia Barrage during the summer of 2007 (which coincided with his hiring at Lehigh) and helped lead his new team to the 2007 Major League Lacrosse Championship, as well as a spot in Championship Weekend in 2008.

Cassese's coaching career before Lehigh included a stint as an assistant coach at his alma mater from 2005-07, helping lead the Blue Devils to the 2007 National Championship Game. He also served as Duke's interim head coach for part of the summer of 2006. Prior to Duke, Cassese spent one season at Stony Brook as an assistant where he directed the nation's top extra man offense and helped the Seawolves to a 10-6 record in the spring of 2005.

WILL SCUDDER

Assistant Coach Sixth Season at Lehigh

Former Lehigh men's lacrosse standout Will Scudder'11 enters his sixth season on the coaching staff in 2019, first as associate head coach and fourth as defensive coordinator.

Scudder replaced Tom Compitello who accepted a position at Sacred Heart (and has since returned to Lehigh), then was promoted prior to the 2015 season. Scudder was promoted to associate defensive coordinator, faceoff coordinator and camps/clinics/tournaments coordinator after Brendan Callahan was named head coach at Dartmouth. He was then named defensive coordinator prior to the 2016 season when Errol Wilson was named offensive coordinator, and named associate head coach following the 2018 season. Scudder was a former team captain and All-Patriot League honoree as a Mountain Hawk.

Scudder has helped Lehigh jump back into the national spotlight as heading into the 2019 season, the Mountain Hawks have been ranked in every "way-early" rankings, coming in as high as No. 8 by the Baltimore Sun. The Mountain Hawks are the only team in the league who has advanced to the last eight Patriot League Tournaments.

In 2018, the Mountain Hawks, were ranked as high as 12th nationally and defeated three nationally-ranked teams – beginning with road wins at No. 12 Army West Point and No. 18/19 Hofstra in the span of 10 days. The Mountain Hawks went on to finish the season 10-7, including 5-3 in Patriot League play. Earning the No. 4 seed in the league tournament, Lehigh dominated Colgate at home (11-6) then picked up a 10-9 overtime win against No. 11/13 Navy, just days after the Midshipmen won at Syracuse. Lucas Spence scored the game-winner less than one minute into overtime as Spence (58 points: 35 goals, 23 assists) and Andrew Pettit (66 points: 46 goals, 20 assists) combined for 124 points in 2018.

Pettit, defenseman Craig Chick and faceoff specialist Conor Gaffney were named first team All-Patriot League while Spence, defenseman Eddie Bouhall and long-stick midfielder Teddy Leggett earned second-team laurels. Leggett ended the year with 61 groundballs, becoming just the third non-faceoff specialist to reach 50 GBs in Kevin Cassese's 11-year tenure as Lehigh head coach, the others being Casey Eidenshink and Chick. Leggett also won the Lehigh Athletics' J. Daniel Nolan Award presented to the department's top first-year male student-athlete. Gaffney was named the Patriot League Scholar-Athlete of the Year while garnering third team Academic All-America recognition by CoSIDA. A former faceoff specialist himself, Scudder worked extensively with Gaffney, who led the Patriot League in faceoff percentage (59.4), while shattering the school record for faceoff wins (212) – which is also good for second in league history.

Scudder oversaw a defense that entered April eighth nationally in allowing just 8.30 goals per game. The Mountain Hawks went on to allow just six goals in the quarterfinals to Colgate and nine in the semifinals vs. Navy. Lehigh's defense was led by Chick, who continued to re-write the record books, breaking his previous school record for caused turnovers with 41. He ended the year with 118 in his career, which is already a school and Patriot League record, and top 10 in NCAA history (with Chick's senior year left to play). After the season, Chick was named a second team Inside Lacrosse All-American while garnering honorable mention All-America from the USILA.

In his first year on the Lehigh staff, Scudder helped coach a strong tandem at faceoff in 2014 that won 54 percent of its draws; Ryan Buttenbaum won 55 percent and Casey McAdam won 52 percent at the X. McAdam was named Patriot League Rookie of the Week after winning 17-of-23 faceoffs against Monmouth then 15-of-20 vs. Holy Cross.

As a team, Lehigh advanced to its third straight Patriot League Championship Game in 2014, finishing the season 13-5 and within just one win of tying the school record set two years prior. The defense allowed just 7.22 goals per game, good for second in the nation and just 0.01 behind the nation's leader.

In 2015, a pair of Mountain Hawks split time at faceoff, both impressing down the stretch. Freshman Matt Ernst showed flashes of greatness, which included a four-game stretch (at Monmouth, Holy Cross, Colgate and vs. Princeton), which saw him win 58 percent of his draws (49-of-85). McAdam

ended his season on a high note, winning 14-of-21 faceoffs in the Patriot League Quarterfinals at Bucknell.

The Mountain Hawks struggled to begin 2015, but bounced back in a big way. Lehigh defeated a pair of nationally-ranked opponents in a five-day span, earning wins over No. 14 Princeton and at Wilson's alma mater and No. 18 Stony Brook. The Mountain Hawks defeated Lafayette in their regular season finale, their fifth win in six games, to reach their fifth straight Patriot League Tournament.

Lehigh advanced to its sixth straight league tournament in 2016, finishing 4-4 in Patriot League play. The Mountain Hawks' defense had plenty of highlight moments. Just a freshman, Chick led the nation in caused turnovers with 37 while senior Tripp Telesco finished tied for ninth with 90. Lehigh allowed just four goals to NJIT, six to Lafayette and seven in a dramatic win at No. 20 Boston University, which essentially clinched the Mountain Hawks' berth into the league tournament.

Scudder helped lead Lehigh to its seventh straight league tournament berth in 2017. As a team, the Mountain Hawks allowed just six goals in a home win over No. 16/18 Boston University. In the next home game, Lehigh allowed just 10 in a win over No. 13/14 Princeton, holding the nation's No. 3 ranked offense to its second lowest total of the season which was five goals less than its season average entering the game. Individually, Chick continued his stellar play, setting a school record with 40 caused turnovers. He and classmate Bouhall combined for 100 groundballs and 60 caused turnovers on the season, both earning All-Patriot League honors. Chick was named to the first team and garnered Inside Lacrosse honorable mention All-America recognition.

Scudder played in 51 games over his career in the Brown and White, highlighted by his junior campaign when he won 56 percent of his faceoffs (140-of-251) to earn Second Team All-Patriot League honors. This came after a sophomore season which saw him win 56 percent (152-of-273) with 69 groundballs. Scudder played a key role in the rise of the Mountain Hawks' program, advancing to the league tournament as a senior in 2011 and helping set the stage for the two straight Patriot League Championships that followed in 2012 and 2013.

Scudder ended his collegiate career by winning 331-of-612 faceoffs (54.1 percent) with 156 groundballs. He also added three goals and four assists. Scudder played in the prestigious North-South Senior All-Star Game following his senior campaign.

Upon graduation, Scudder worked with A.G. Administrators, Inc. in the sports insurance industry from Summer 2011 until Spring 2013, while also serving as an assistant lacrosse coach at Great Valley High School in Fall 2012 and Spring 2013. While at Great Valley, he helped lead the school to its first league title, coached six First Team All-Chesmont players, two members of the All-State team and one ALL American. He then moved onto Fever Lacrosse Inc. in Haverford, Pa. where he served and continues to serve as Director of Operations, in charge of managing tournaments, camps, clinics, and the 14 club teams within the Fever Program.

Coach Scudder resides in Historic Bethlehem with his wife Megan, former Lehigh graduate '10 and women's lacrosse player.



# TOM COMPITELLO

Assistant Coach First Season at Lehigh

Tom Compitello begins his first season at Lehigh as fulltime assistant coach in 2019, and third overall. Compitello, who began his coaching career as a volunteer assistant

during the Mountain Hawks' back-to-back Patriot League Championship seasons in 2012 and 2013, was most recently on the Yale coaching staff. In his seven years as a collegiate coach, Compitello has helped his teams to a championship in five years – four conference championships and the 2018 National Championship with Yale. Including his time as a player, Compitello's teams have advanced to a conference championship game in eight of the last 10 years

Compitello will coach on the offensive side of the field for the Mountain Hawks, while also serving as the goalie coach, something he has experience with during his time at Yale and also at Bryant, where he coached the program's all-time leader in saves, Gunnar Waldt, who finished his incredible career as a USILA All-American in 2016.

Compitello began his career on the Mountain Hawk coaching staff for Lehigh's first two Patriot League Tournament titles and NCAA Tournament appearances in program history. While at Lehigh, he served as the assistant offensive coordinator, assistant extra-man offense coordinator, and the substitution game coordinator. In 2012, Lehigh's man-up unit was No. 1 in the nation (54.2 percent), something the Mountain Hawks also accomplished this past season – when they were the nation's best unit at 63.4 percent. Lehigh's offense exploded in the Patriot League Tournament, scoring a league tournament record 29 goals. The Mountain Hawks followed in 2013 by winning the Patriot League Regular Season and Tournament titles. In the end, Compitello helped coach three of the program's top five point-getters in school history: Dan Taylor (second, 220), David DiMaria (third, 205) and Dante Fantoni (fifth, 177).

Compitello then transitioned to Sacred Heart where he led the Pioneers to a 4-2 NEC mark and No. 3 seed in the conference tournament in 2014, which still stands as program records for Northeast Conference wins and best finish (third place) in program history. Compitello acted as offensive and extra-man coordinator, as Sacred Heart finished third in the conference in goals per game (10.13) and tied for the most assists per contest (6.20).

Compitello moved onto Bryant University where he led the Bulldogs to NEC Tournament Titles and NCAA Tournament berths in two of his three seasons, serving as Bryant's offensive coordinator, extra-man coordinator and goalie coach. In 2016, the Bulldogs finished 19th nationally in scoring offense (11.20 goals per game) as Bryant finished 10-5 overall and 5-1 in the conference. Compitello led the Bulldogs to NCAA Tournament berths in 2015 and 2017, which includes beating Monmouth in the 2017 NCAA Tournament before dropping a competitive 13-10 final at No. 1 Maryland.

In 2018, Compitello served as an assistant coach at Yale, coordinating the nation's No. 11 extra man unit, assisting with the nation's No. 2 scoring offense and also mentoring the goaltenders on the way to the Bulldogs first-ever National Championship. Under his guidance, Jack Starr enjoyed a strong NCAA Tournament, making nine saves, allowing just five goals in the quarterfinals vs. Loyola, before combining for 16 stops in the semifinals and championship games. In the semifinals against Albany, Starr stopped five of the first seven shots sent his way to help the Bulldogs score the game's first seven games.

A 2011 graduate of Stony Brook, Compitello was an All-American and first team All-Conference attackman. He posted 146 career points (68 goals, 78 assists) and was named to the Tewaaraton Award Watch List as a senior. He was also the 28th overall selection in the 2011 Major League Lacrosse Draft. Compitello led Stony Brook to the 2010 America East Championship, including an NCAA Tournament win over Denver to reach the National Quarterfinals. Stony Brook also reached the America East finals in 2009 and 2011.

Eidenshink then played in all 18 games as a sophomore, recording 29 groundballs and 16 caused turnovers to help the Mountain Hawks back to the league title game. He had a career-high 50 groundballs and 23 caused turnovers as a junior, along with 32 groundballs and nine caused turnovers as a senior.

As a senior, Eidenshink was named a candidate for the prestigious Senior CLASS Award, played in the USILA North-South All-Star Game and was a USILA Scholar-All-American. He was selected by the Charlotte Hounds in the 2016 Major League Lacrosse Supplemental Draft.

Following his playing days, Eidenshink has worked for Lincoln Investment Planning as a Junior Research Analyst. He worked under two Portfolio/Wealth Managers, assisting with Mutual Fund and ETF research for their portfolios, which are globally diversified and set up to help clients save and prepare for their retirements.

Eidenshink has taught the game of lacrosse as part of the HeadStrong Lacrosse Club. He graduated Lehigh in May of 2016 with a Bachelor of Science in finance.

# GAME 1 • FEB. 2, 2019 BETHLEHEM, PA. NO. 13 LEHIGH 15, NJIT 8

BETHLEHEM, Pa. – The No. 13 ranked Lehigh men's lacrosse team scored the game's first four goals and wouldn't look back, downing NJIT in its season opener on Saturday at the Ulrich Sports Complex, 15-8. Lehigh's starting attack and midfield combined for 11 goals, while its starting defensemen tallied 17 groundballs and 12 caused turnovers, in an impressive effort at both ends of the field.

Senior Lucas Spence led the offense with six points behind two goals and a career-high four assists. Classmates Tristan Rai and Mickey Fitzpatrick each had two goals and an assist, respectively. Junior Andrew Eichelberger led a strong midfield, scoring three goals for his first-career hat trick.

Defensively, senior **Craig Chick** recorded nine groundballs and five caused turnovers to move from eighth all the way into a tie for fourth place in NCAA history, now with 123 in his career. Classmate **Eddie Bouhall** had five caused turnovers, a career high, along with seven groundballs. Another senior, **Matt Rimol**, recorded a groundball and two caused turnovers.

Other strong efforts included junior **Conor Gaffney** in the faceoff circle, who won 14-of-20 draws with 10 groundballs. Sophomore long-stick midfielder **Teddy Leggett** had five groundballs and a caused turnover, and scored his third-career goal. Freshman **Judah Hicks** had four groundballs and two caused turnovers as well. Senior **Alexander Tumminello** scored a career-high two goals.

The Mountain Hawks opened the game on a 4-0 run, with goals from Eichelberger, Spence, freshman **Tommy Schelling** and Rai. NJIT got on the board with two late in the first quarter, pulling within 4-2 after one.

Lehigh scored four second-quarter goals, with one Highlanders' tally sandwiched in between. Eichelberger had two of them, at the 13:24 and 6:20 marks. The first of two goals from Tumminello came with eight seconds left in the quarter to give the Mountain Hawks an 8-3 halftime lead.

The Mountain Hawks continued the momentum into the second, scoring six of the first eight goals. A 5-0 Lehigh run ended with two goals in 16 seconds. Freshman **Mike Monitto** scored the first of his career at 10:49 of the fourth, then Fitzpatrick found Spence at the 10:33 mark to give the Mountain Hawks a 14-5 advantage.

NJIT scored three of the final four goals, with Lehigh's goal coming from freshman **Cole Kirst**, as the Mountain Hawks wrapped up the 15-8

Final shots were 48-21 in favor of Lehigh while the Mountain Hawks held a 56-36 edge in groundballs. Sophomore goaltender **James Spence** made three saves over the first 49:11 before being relieved by junior **Colin Kirst**, who made two. Lehigh ended up causing 19 of NJIT's 30 turnovers.

# GAME 2 • FEB. 9, 2019 BETHLEHEM, PA. HOFSTRA 4, NO. 13 LEHIGH 3

BETHLEHEM, Pa. – Leading 3-1 heading to the fourth quarter, the No. 13 Lehigh men's lacrosse team fell victim to a 3-0 Hofstra run to end the game, as the Pride defeated the Mountain Hawks 4-3 on Saturday afternoon at the Ulrich Sports Complex. In a low-scoring, defensive battle, senior **Mickey Fitzpatrick** scored his second of the game with three seconds left in the third quarter, but Hofstra would take control from there. Sophomore **James Spence** was sensational in goal for the Mountain Hawks, making a career-high 16 saves, including stopping 14-of-15 shots sent his way over the first three quarters.

Junior **Ryan Klose** scored Lehigh's other goal while senior **Eddie Bouhall** assisted on the Mountain Hawks' third-quarter score. Senior **Craig Chick** tallied five groundballs and two caused turnovers to reach 125 in his career, moving into sole possession of third place in NCAA history in that category. Sophomore **Teddy Leggett** was tremendous with six groundballs and four caused turnovers to tie a career high.

Lehigh jumped out to a 2-0 lead, with goals from Klose at 2:42 of the first quarter and Fitzpatrick at 6:24 of the second. The Mountain Hawks held the Pride scoreless for the game's first 24:07 until Whit Stopak pulled his team within 2-1 at the half.

The third quarter saw 25 shots between the two teams, with the 25th finding the back of the net on a transition opportunity. Spence made a save on one end, Bouhall made the clear and found Fitzpatrick to give Lehigh a 3-1 advantage.

Hofstra took over in the fourth, however, scoring at the 13:38 and 11:43 marks to pull even, before Matt Elder gave the Pride a 4-3 edge with 1:42 remaining. Lehigh won the ensuing faceoff and had a chance, but the Mountain Hawks' 16th turnover of the game gave the ball back to Pride and they would run out the clock.

Final shots were 38-36 in favor of Lehigh while the Mountain Hawks held a 36-25 edge in groundballs. Hofstra had 19 turnovers, 13 of which were caused by Lehigh. Junior **Conor Gaffney** was just 2-of-6 facing off through three quarters, but was 4-of-4 in the fourth to finish 6-of-10 with two groundballs. Spence's career-high 16 saves came across Hofstra's Robert Casey, who had 14.

CHARLOTTEVILLE, Va. – The Lehigh men's lacrosse team scored five straight first-half goals to take a 5-2 lead and 6-4 halftime advantage, but No. 11 Virginia responded with seven in the second to down the Mountain Hawks, 11-8 on Friday evening at Klockner Stadium. Virginia scored the first four second-half goals to take an 8-6 lead before Tumminello scored his hat-trick goal on a nifty inside move to pull the Mountain Hawks within 8-7 with 13:43 left in the fourth quarter. The Cavaliers responded with three of the game's final four goals, the only Lehigh goal coming from Rai, as Virginia wrapped up the 11-8 victory.

ITHACA, N.Y. – The Lehigh men's lacrosse team jumped out to a 5-0 lead on No. 4 Cornell midway through the first quarter and held the lead for much of the contest, but the Big Red exploded for seven fourth-quarter goals to come back and beat the Mountain Hawks, 14-9 on Saturday. Lehigh had eight different goal scorers, with senior **Alexander Tumminello** netting two goals to lead the way. The Mountain Hawks outscored the Big Red 3-2 in the third quarter, which began with goals from defensive midfielders Leggett and junior **Erik DiGirolamo**. Tumminello's rip with 42 seconds left in the quarter gave Lehigh a 9-7 lead heading to the fourth.

That's when Cornell's offense came alive, scoring four times in the first 4:32 before adding three insurance goals for the 14-9 final.

Final shots were 36-33 in favor of Lehigh while the Mountain Hawks held a 31-25 edge in groundballs. Sophomore **James Spence** made nine saves in goal across Cornell's Caelahn Bullen, who made 14.

# GAME 5 • MAR. 2, 2019 HAMILTON, N.Y. LEHIGH 10, NO. 16 COLGATE 8

HAMILTON, N.Y. – After No. 16 Colgate scored four straight third-quarter goals to pull even at six, the Lehigh men's lacrosse team responded with a 3-0 run of its own, on the way to a 10-8 Patriot League opening win on Saturday. Senior **Lucas Spence** returned to the lineup, posting three goals and five assists, while his brother – sophomore **James Spence** – made 11 saves between the pipes. Junior **Conor Gaffney** was sensational facing off, winning 17-of-20 with 14 groundballs. The win marks Lehigh's first over a nationally-ranked opponent since beating No. 11/13 Navy in the Patriot League Semifinals last season.

Lehigh has now won its league opener in nine of the last 10 years, and beaten Colgate for the ninth time in the last 10 tries. The Mountain Hawks are now 2-3, 1-0 in league play while the Raiders fall to 2-2, 0-1 in the Patriot League.

Along with Spence's five points, junior Andrew Eichelberger scored twice while senior Tristan Rai had a goal and two assists. Junior Crew Cintron added a goal and assist for his first points of the season. Defensively, senior Eddie Bouhall had two groundballs and a caused turnover, as the D allowed just two first-half goals and none over the final 11:58.

Spence opened the scoring less than a minute in. After the Raiders evened it up on the extra man almost 10 minutes later, the Mountain Hawks ended the half with five of the final six goals. Cintron began by scoring his first of the season, Eichelberger scored twice before Spence and senior **Mickey Fitzpatrick** helped Lehigh go up 6-2 with 7:07 left in the second quarter, which proved to be the halftime score.

Colgate responded with a 4-0 run to begin the second half to pull even at six late in the third quarter. That's when Lehigh exploded for three goals over the final 2:51 of the stanza, beginning with Rai on a strong feed from Kirst.

Then, junior **Ryan Klose** beat the buzzer, scoring with less than a second on the clock to give Lehigh a 9-6 lead heading to the fourth.

The Mountain Hawks scored just once in the fourth, but it was a big one from senior **Alexander Tumminello**. The defense stood tall, allowing just two goals, as Lehigh wrapped up the 10-8 victory.

Final shots were 37-32 in favor of Lehigh while the Mountain Hawks held a dominant 31-10 edge in groundballs. Spence's 11 saves came across Colgate's Connor Mullen, who made 16.

# GAME 6 • MAR. 9, 2019 BETHLEHEM, PA. LEHIGH 11, NO. 17 ARMY WEST POINT 8

BETHLEHEM, Pa. – After No. 16/17 Army West Point scored first, the Lehigh men's lacrosse team recorded two separate 4-0 runs and never trailed again as the Mountain Hawks picked up another big Patriot League win, 11-8, on Saturday afternoon. Senior **Lucas Spence** led the offense with three goals and an assist, good for his second straight hat trick since his return to the lineup. Junior **Conor Gaffney** continued his stellar play facing off, winning 18-of-23 with 11 groundballs to improve his season percentage to 70.6. With the victory, Lehigh improves to 3-3, 2-0 in Patriot League play while handing the Black Knights just their second loss of the season. Army is now 4-2, 1-1 in league play.

Along with Spence's four points, three others scored two goals apiece – junior **Andrew Eichelberger**, freshman **Cole Kirst** and freshman **Tommy Schelling**. It marked the first-career multi-goal games by both Kirst and Schelling. Seniors **Mickey Fitzpatrick** and **Alexander Tumminello** each had a goal and assist.

Defensively, senior **Craig Chick** tallied four groundballs and four caused turnovers. Classmate **Eddie Bouhall** had four groundballs and a caused turnover while shutting down Army attackman Brendan Nichtern. After entering the game with 24 points (12 goals, 12 assists) through five games, Nichtern had just a goal and assist. The assist came on an unsettled situation in which Bouhall wasn't covering him.

Lehigh's win marked its second straight victory over a ranked opponent, one Saturday after a 10-8 win at No. 16/19 Colgate. It marked the first time since 2015 that the Mountain Hawks have won consecutive games vs. ranked foes.

The Black Knights opened a 1-0 lead less than a minute in, but the Mountain Hawks had quite the response. It began with a Tumminello score and included goals from Spence, Fitzpatrick, then Spence again to give Lehigh a 4-1 lead after a quarter of play.

Lehigh held Army to just three first-quarter shots, shutting out the Black Knights for 19:35 in total. The Black Knights got back on the board with three straight second-quarter goals, at the 9:43, 6:11 and 3:59 marks. Schelling had a big answer, however, with just three seconds left in the half, to put the Mountain Hawks up 5-4 after 30 minutes of play.

Army scored an unsettled goal off a faceoff just 30 seconds into the third quarter, but Schelling again had an answer. His career-high second of the game came just 35 seconds later as Lehigh regained a 7-5 lead. That sparked a 4-0 run, with goals coming from Kirst, Eichelberger then Kirst again, putting the Mountain Hawks up 9-5 heading to the fourth.

The Black Knights got as close as 10-8 with 6:02 remaining, but Lehigh's defense continued to stand tall, and Spence iced the victory at the 2:01 with an unassisted goal that put Lehigh up 11-8, which proved to be the final.

# GAME 7 • MAR. 12, 2019 PISCATAWAY, N.J. NO. 16 LEHIGH 13, NO. 15 RUTGERS 10

PISCATAWAY, N.J. - No. 15 Rutgers scored four straight goals bridging the second and third quarters to take an 8-5 lead, but No. 16 Lehigh staged a furious comeback, using two separate four-goal runs to down the Scarlet Knights 13-10 on Tuesday evening at HighPoint. com Stadium. Lehigh ended the third quarter with four straight goals over the final 3:10 before ending the fourth with a 4-0 run in the final 5:50 to pick up the program's first win over Rutgers since 1961. Senior Alexander Tumminello led the offense with a career-high four goals while classmate Lucas Spence had two goals and two assists, but it was freshman Tommy Schelling who scored what proved to be the game-winner with 2:19 remaining.

A number of Mountain Hawks stepped up as Lehigh won its third straight game, all coming in the last 11 days, and all against ranked opponents. It marks the first time the Mountain Hawks have beaten three straight ranked foes since 2013, but that wasn't in three consecutive games.

Sophomore **Joel Trucksess** stepped in at faceoff and was stellar, winning 8-of-10 with four groundballs. He scored a big goal as well to pull Lehigh within 8-7, just 12 seconds after senior **Craig Chick** snapped the Mountain Hawks' 18:36 scoreless drought to pull them within two. Chick led the defense with three groundballs and three caused turnovers. Anchoring the defense was sophomore goaltender **James Spence**, who made a career-high 17 saves.

The teams traded the game's first six goals, with the Mountain Hawks holding 1-0, 2-1 and 3-2 leads. Rutgers responded with two straight to take its first lead at 4-3, but senior **Mickey Fitzpatrick** scored his second of the half at 10:02 of the second quarter to pull even at four. Tumminello's second came at the 6:46 mark, giving the Mountain Hawks a 5-4 edge.

The Scarlet Knights came right back with the final two goals of the half, extending the run to 4-0 into the third quarter, as Rutgers opened an 8-5 advantage. That's when Chick caused a turnover on one end and scored a goal just moments later on the other. Lehigh followed with goals from Trucksess, Tumminello and Spence to take a 9-8 lead into the fourth quarter. Tumminello's third came with 52 seconds remaining and Spence's came with just five seconds on the clock.

Rutgers scored twice in 43 seconds in the fourth quarter to open a 10-9 edge, but the Mountain Hawks wouldn't go down quietly. Spence made a move in front of the goal and finished at 5:50 to even the score at 10.

Schelling added the game-winner at 2:19 then the Mountain Hawks got insurance goals from Tumminello at 1:21, and junior **Christian McHugh** at the 30-second mark, to wrap up the 13-10 victory.

# GAME 8 • MAR. 17, 2019 BETHLEHEM, PA. NO. 16 LEHIGH 15, LAFAYETTE 7

BETHLEHEM, Pa. – The No. 16 Lehigh men's lacrosse team jumped out to a 4-0 lead after one quarter of play and Lafayette didn't get any closer than four the rest of the way as the Mountain Hawks picked up their 10th straight win over archrival Lafayette, downing the Leopards 15-7 on Sunday afternoon. The 10 straight wins ties the school-record winning streak against Lafayette. Senior **Tristan Rai** led the offense with seven points (four goals, three assists) to tie a career high, tying his previous high set last season against the Leopards. The Mountain Haws' fourth straight win overall marks their longest since the 2014 season; they improve to 5-3 overall and 3-0 in league play heading into a showdown at Navy on Saturday.

Along with Rai's seven points, classmate Lucas Spence had six (three goals, three assists) while senior Alexander Tumminello had three goals for his second straight hat trick and third of his career, all coming this season. # GAME 9 • MAR. 23, 2019 ANNAPOLIS, MD. NO. 15 LEHIGH 15, NAVY 8

ANNAPOLIS, Md. – Trailing 6-4 early in the third quarter, the No. 15 Lehigh men's lacrosse team ended the game on an 11-2 run to give the Mountain Hawks their fifth straight victory, a 15-8 triumph at Navy on Saturday afternoon at Navy Marine-Corps Memorial Stadium. The win marks the 100th in **Kevin Cassese's** head coaching career, all coming at Lehigh. In his 12th year, Cassese is the fastest coach in program history to reach the milestone, and just the second overall. Lehigh's seven-goal win marked its largest-ever margin of victory at Navy, and second largest overall in the 41 all-time games between the two schools, a series that dates back to 1910.

With the win, the Mountain Hawks improve to 6-3. They are 4-0 in Patriot League play for a second straight season. Lehigh's five-game winning streak is the program's longest since 2013.

Senior Lucas Spence led the offense with six points behind four goals and two assists. Since his return to the lineup earlier this month, Spence has 25 points (15 goals, 10 assists) in five games, scoring multiple goals in all five contests, including four hat tricks. Included for Spence was one of the goals of the year, not only for Lehigh, but arguably all of NCAA Lacrosse.

Senior **Tristan Rai** added four points via two goals and two assists while classmates **Mickey Fitzpatrick** and **Alexander Tumminello** each had two goals apiece. Freshman **Tommy Schelling** posted a career-high three points (two goals, one assist). Junior **Crew Cintron** tied a career high with two points (one goal, one assist). Senior **Craig Chick** helped lead the defense with three groundballs and a caused turnover. Tumminello and junior **Erik DiGirolamo** each caused a turnover as well. Sophomore **Matt Douglas** collected a career-high eight groundballs.

Junior Conor Gaffney finished 17-of-26 facing off. After winning just 5-of-10 in the second half, he won 12-of-16 in the second, putting together another spectacular performance. Sophomore James Spence was stellar in goal, making a career-high tying 17 saves for the second time in the last three games. During Lehigh's five-game winning streak, Spence has stopped 62-of-101 shots sent his way (61.4 percent).

Tied 1-1 late in the first quarter, Lehigh got goals from Cintron and Spence in the final 1:18 of the stanza to take a 3-1 lead after one quarter of play.

The Midshipmen scored four straight to begin the second and take a 5-3 lead, but a big man-up goal from Fitzpatrick pulled Lehigh within 5-4 at the half.

Navy increased its lead back to two at 6-4, but a Tumminello goal from Rai at the 9:20 mark was the beginning of a big run as Lehigh would score six straight goals and 10 of the next 11. The run featured a little bit of everything – including tic-tac-toe passing, taking advantage of transition opportunities and an extra-man goal.

Defense to offense led to a Schelling goal and a 6-6 deadlock with exactly seven minutes on the third-quarter clock.

Then, Spence's highlight-reel gave Lehigh a 7-6 lead at the 5:20 mark before Tumminello gave the Mountain Hawks an 8-6 advantage with 3:40 remaining in the third.

Eventually, the 10-1 run ended with two Lehigh goals in the span of seven seconds, first from junior **Ryan Klose** man-up, then Spence from Rai off the ensuing faceoff to give Lehigh a 14-7 lead at the 6:08 mark. The day was capped off by Gaffney scoring his first-career goal in the final minute to account for the 15-8 final.

# GAME 10 • MAR. 30, 2019 BETHLEHEM, PA. NO. 15 LEHIGH 10, BOSTON UNIVERSITY 8

BETHLEHEM, Pa. – The Lehigh men's lacrosse team outscored visiting Boston University 5-0 in the third quarter to take a 10-5 lead into the fourth, then held off a late Terriers' charge, as the Mountain Hawks picked up their sixth straight win, 10-8 on Saturday afternoon. Junior **Andrew Eichelberger** scored three goals for his second-career hat trick while senior **Tristan Rai** tied a career-high four assists. Sophomore goaltender **James Spence** was strong once again, making 13 saves, including stopping all six shots sent his way in the third quarter. The Mountain Hawks improve to 7-3 on the season, 5-0 in Patriot League play heading into a first-place showdown at No. 6 Loyola next Saturday on CBS Sports Network.

With the win and results around the league, Lehigh clinched its ninth straight Patriot League Tournament berth. The Mountain Hawks are the only team in the league to qualify for each of the last nine tournaments.

Along with Eichelberger and Rai, senior Lucas Spence had two goals and an assist while classmate Alexander Tumminello scored twice. The other goals came from junior Ryan Klose and freshmen Tommy Schelling and Cole Kirst.

Defensively, senior **Craig Chick** collected a groundball, the 200th of his career, and two caused turnovers. Sophomore **Teddy Leggett** had six groundballs to reach exactly 100 in his career, along with a caused turnover. Junior **Conor Gaffney** had another strong day facing off, winning 14-of-22 with 11 groundballs.

Goals from Eichelberger and Tumminello at the 13:00 and 9:22 marks gave Lehigh an early 2-0 first-quarter lead. The Terriers answered with the next three, including two in the final 29 seconds of the first quarter, to take a 3-2 lead early in the second.

The Mountain Hawks scored the next three – from Eichelberger, Klose and Spence – to retake a 5-3 lead, but Boston University answered with the final two first-half scores to pull even at five following 30 minutes of play.

The third quarter saw five Lehigh goals from five different goal scorers. Eichelberger began the second half much like the first, with a goal (at the 12:11 mark). Tumminello followed with his second man-up goal of the day at 9:34. After a goal from Schelling, Lehigh scored twice in the final 43 seconds of the stanza, Spence (man-up) and Kirst, to take a 10-5 lead.

The Terriers quickly scored three times in the first 4:35 of the fourth to get back into the game, but Lehigh's defense buckled down from there. Neither team scored for the game's final 10:25, with Spence making three big saves to keep Lehigh in front 10-8, which proved to be the final.

# GAME 11 • APR. 6, 2019 BALTIMORE, MD. NO. 2 LOYOLA 15, NO. 15 LEHIGH 9

BALTIMORE – No. 2 Loyola jumped out to a 6-0 lead after one quarter and 9-0 advantage early in the second, and despite the Mountain Hawks beginning to hit their stride, the closest they could the margin to was six in a 15-9 defeat on Saturday. Lehigh pulled within 10-4 and 12-6 in the third quarter, needing one more surge to pull within striking distance, but the Greyhounds always had an answer. The loss is Lehigh's first since February, snapping a six-game winning streak. The Mountain Hawks fall to 7-4 on the season, 5-1 in Patriot League play while Loyola improves to 8-2 and 5-0.

Arguably the nation's top attackman, and player, Pat Spencer finished with five goals and six assists for his second straight game with 10+ points.

No other Greyhounds' player had more than three points. Lehigh was just 14-of-19 on the clear and couldn't maintain possession like it needed in order to limit Spencer's touches.

Sophomore **Teddy Leggett** enjoyed a strong game defensively and on the faceoff wing, posting seven groundballs and four caused turnovers, both tying career highs. Offensively, three Mountain Hawks scored two goals apiece – senior **Tristan Rai**, junior **Ryan Klose** and freshman **Cole Kirst**. The goal totals set a career high for Klose, while tying Kirst's career best.

Spencer had a hand in six of Loyola's first nine goals in the early surge. Rai got the Mountain Hawks on the board at the 8:26 mark of the second quarter, off a tremendous pass from freshman **Tommy Schelling** (who dished a career-high three assists on the afternoon). Schelling assisted Klose less than two minutes later. After a Loyola score at the 2:21 mark, senior **Mickey Fitzpatrick** fed Kirst in front of the goal, who beat the horn to pull Lehigh within 10-3 at the half.

Senior **Alexander Tumminello** got the second-half scoring started on a delayed penalty just over a minute in, pulling the Mountain Hawks back within six for the first of three times in the half. Later in the quarter, consecutive goals from Rai and Kirst pulled the Mountain Hawks within 12-6 at the 4:15 mark, but three straight Loyola goals bridging the end of the third quarter and beginning of the fourth erased any doubt.

Lehigh closed the game on a 3-0 run, with goals from Klose (man-up), senior **Jackson Monnin** and junior **Andrew Eichelberger**, to pull within 15-9 when the clocks hit zero.

Final shots were 47-39 in favor of Loyola while the Greyhounds held a 35-28 edge in groundballs. Junior **Conor Gaffney** was 10-of-21 facing off (and Lehigh was 11-of-27 for the game). Gaffney did reach the 500 career faceoff win plateau, becoming the first in school history and fourth in Patriot League history to reach that milestone.

Sophomore **James Spence** made 12 saves for Lehigh, including six in the third quarter and nine in the second half. Senior **Chris Kiernan** entered late and made a stop for the Mountain Hawks. Jacob Stover finished with 15 saves for Loyola.
